The sense of relief when granted an exeat to Wymondham or Attleborough, crafty drinks in Besthorpe George on Sunday afternoons with a guard outside. The vivid memory of weeks of quarantine when Sheila Curson contracted polio and the prospect of our dorm being cooped up with Miss Brunning. After weeks of total isolation with meals and school work sent down to us we emerged with a much higher regard for Miss B., she was a real trouper and allowed us to put on Saturday night variety shows. Eileen Blunden was always the star turn with her good looks and talent for singing and dancing - whatever happened to Eileen? Broadway?*

John Beales (53-) was particularly delighted to see **Miss Dolan** his matron for several years. *It is strange that*

teachers always looked old to us, but of course, many of them in the fifties were young and in their first job, and so grew old with us, like Roger Garrard, who looks just like he did then, and Andy Seeley

Phillip Jones (78-84) was so very nearly on the doomed flight from Boston to LA *If there can be any good coming out of this senseless act it must surely be the strengthened sense of community we are feeling and the renewed respect and love we have for other people. In all of this the virtual community is important too. I have finally made it home to Los Angeles after a week stuck in Philadelphia.*

Granville and Sue Perkin (67-74 69-74) *here in Geneva, Switzerland everyone is numb. Many people here travel back and forwards to NYC. Hundreds of Swiss are also missing. Close friends we have made here went back to Washington to work, at the Pentagon. But safe..... The 3 minutes silence today was so powerfulour eldest daughter was on way back from field trip in south of France and ALL the traffic stopped on the autoroute.*

Surely, this must and will bring most people closer together..

Dan Bookham (84-91) *I live in Bar Harbor, Maine, about 500 miles north of NYC and 800 miles north of D.C. but it appears the tragedy has touched our small community of 4000 in many ways. So far we have lost 2 people confirmed in the World Trade Centre and it seems that some of the terrorists gained access to the US via our ferry link to Canada. We pride ourselves on our friendly welcome we give to all our 4 million annual visitors regardless of national origin, but I can't help but feel some of our innocence has been forever destroyed. Still the whole world*

will draw from this and perhaps become better and stronger.

Brian Raines (51-56) *Although I do not live in the city I did return to "Up State N.Y" last Sunday.*

Yes I am fortunate, but we are reliving the horror of Pan Am

flight 103. on a larger scale. 103 was the loss of a friend's son, this time a number of friends and associates are "missing". I think of the anguish of the Zwynenburg family and friends of the one person, and try and relate it to a much larger number, and have to multiply it by X?. I hope we all find some peace and better understanding.

David Turner (51-58) *we are far from NY but never the less just as close when it comes to sadness over the loss of lives. I have one co worker whose brother walked out of the WT tower just 5 minutes before the first aircraft hit and his daughter works in Manhattan, both are ok. We have plenty of friends and co workers who are stranded in cities in the US and abroad, some driving home from Florida to Seattle. As a worker in the Defense Industry we are on full support for the actions our President may demand. Our American and British flags are flying high on our home flagpole*

Robby Fielding (West 53-57) *We are still numb with the thought of the unspeakable evil that so instantly changed so many lives across the world. We still have close ties to the military community, although we have retired from active duty. We find that we have friends who have friends who are not coming home, ever again. In this small military facility the loss is deep and raw and we dread the impending retaliation that must come.*

Paul Flattery (53-58) *LA was shut down, of course, and we are just finding out the new tighter security measures for travel. I fly a lot and so it will impact, but we know it should be safer. On a personal note, I have had to cancel a network special that was to shoot next week honoring the actor Nicholas Cage -- he felt uncomfortable being honored under such circumstances, especially in the light of some of his more famous roles being ones dealing with acts of extreme violence against the United States. My other big show right now - the rather inconsequential "Miss America" competition is carrying on with a more patriotic twist. Sad days indeed.*

Obituaries

Mr Frank Laughton (1912-2001)

It was with great sadness that former colleagues and students learned of the death of Mr Frank Laughton in April 2001. Mr Laughton was a member of the Maths Department throughout the 1960s and early 1970s but it will perhaps be by those first members of the then new Norwich House in Peel Hall that he will best be remembered.

In 1961 Mr Laughton became the first Housemaster of the newly created Norwich House which was brought together by transferring some pupils from the old East and West houses. Frank Laughton and his wife, Cynthia, quickly established a happy and supportive atmosphere through a combination of consideration, kindness and commitment to. He was no easy touch and you knew if you had incurred his displeasure, but there was still a strong sense that 'it hurt him more than us' when that displeasure had to be demonstrated in a tangible way, which was very rare. I recall his determination to (unsuccessfully) instil good behaviour in his dog - the House (probably the whole College) regularly being woken by cries of 'Nikki come here! Come here I say, will you come here.....'(she didn't). His forays onto the Anglia Television screen to read the weather report were also slightly disconcerting - there was always a sense that it wasn't you watching him, but the other way round.

A very happy occasion was the marriage in 1966 of Mr and Mrs Laughton's daughter, Sally, to Keith Davitte, a popular history and economics teacher and inspirational rugby coach. The day of the wedding was quite coincidentally preceded by a House party, which was attended by Mr and Mrs Laughton, Sally and Keith which reflected the spirit he had created in Norwich House and the mutual affection in which the House and Housemaster held each other.

After his retirement he continued to live with Cynthia in Wymondham. He enjoyed his garden and one could always be assured of a warm welcome if one popped in to see him, and he took a continuing interest in the lives of the former

members of his House. Of course his main joy was his extended family and he took great pride in his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren to whom we send our sympathy and thanks for what he did for those first members of Norwich House.

Jeremy Betts (70-73)

It is with great sadness that we record the untimely death of Jeremy Betts on 16 January 2001. He went on to City College and from there into Insurance. Then as a mature student he gained a BA in Theology, finally working as a teacher of Religious Studies at Burlington Danes School in Hammersmith. Here he felt he had found his true vocation, he loved his work there with children from various ethnic backgrounds and religious beliefs. He was always known in Norwich for his love of music and people. He was part of the choir and played the organ at his local church. His long term interest in music had been a great help to him in his teaching career, enabling him to communicate more fully with his pupils. Jeremy died of complications following a compound fracture of the leg, sustained in an accident.

Peter Sadler (1941-2001) - The Facts

Peter attended Wymondham College and migrated to Australia, with his family, in 1959. He left Wymondham after the Lower Sixth and went to Australia with his parents. He regretted not having completed his "A" levels. Years later he continued his education at university level. He was the first ex-Wymondham College Student to join the Australian Army

Initially Peter was a Topographical Surveyor; he served on mapping operations in Cape York and Papua New Guinea. He graduated from Officer Cadet School in December 1964. and was second in his class and awarded the Staff Prize. (Peter was the second ex-W.C. Student to receive a Commission in the Australian Army; I had been commissioned some six months earlier.)

Peter commanded an Artillery Survey Section in Vietnam and had numerous postings whilst in the Army. Resigning from the Army in 1983, he continued to instruct in the Army Reserves for another five years.

Peter attended the Australian National University from 1987 to 1992 and graduated with an Honours Degree in Modern History. Coincidentally both of his children attended the ANU at the same time as he did.

He wrote poetry, short stories, articles and letters - many were published. His book on the biography of Major-General Gellibrand was published in April 2000, a copy of which is in the College Library.

Peter died on 9 October 2001. He is survived by his wife, Annette, and two children, Christopher and Nicole, and three grandchildren.

My Thoughts

I first remember Peter Scott Sadler "Scotty" at

Wymondham College in the mid 1950s. He was a lanky fellow and in my mind's eye I can see him running on to the rugby field with water, towels and, no doubt, Dencor Rub, to give succour to some injured player.

Peter was different. He had been to the live theatre in London; he didn't have a broad Norfolk accent, which meant he could be understood outside the County! He also liked and I believe actually listened to classical music; remember that this was pre Rock and Roll days.

Peter once asked me how I thought he would be remembered. A tough question when you are looking into the eyes of a man dying of cancer. How do I remember him? I remember a man just returned from Vietnam sitting in the corner of my lounge in physical pain, in mental anguish. He was never to recover from the physical problems he developed as a result of Vietnam service. As for the emotional trauma that's the subject of many a Ph.D. Fortunately it can be shared with "Old Soldiers". I remember a friend dying of cancer who was in extreme pain and handled that pain with courage way beyond what most men would suffer. I remember a mate who enjoyed fine food and good wine, did not suffer fools lightly, enjoyed a good debate, had a good knowledge of English which he could (and sometimes did) use to devastating effect.

Peter and I often discussed Wymondham College. It was where he developed his solid Christian beliefs; he appreciated the influence and devotion of the teachers. He was grateful for the foresight of various people and he never lost sight of the privilege it had been to be selected and attend Wymondham.

I remember Peter as a schoolboy, an officer, a husband, a father and a myriad of other things. Above all I remember him as a friend and a mate and I miss him.

Jack Hawkyard (54-64) will be remembered with gratitude by all those privileged to be in his A level Maths and Further Maths sets in the 50s and 60s. A dynamic, inspiring teacher, he had the whole department organised with legendary precision, and his lessons, as might be expected, were structured with infinite care, leaving nothing to chance. He was housemaster of North House, in the nissen hut days, and moved with two-thirds of them into Lincoln Hall, to be the first housemaster of York House. There too everything ran with dedicated efficiency. Woe to the boy who slacked, or preferred to spend his leisure time in idle pursuits!

There was another side to him too, of course. I came to know him well in the comradely days of the huts. He had an engaging sense of humour and a love of music, particularly Gilbert and Sullivan. While his love of sport, especially cricket, was manifested in an infectious northern enthusiasm; the keen but friendly rivalry of the houses in those early days was reflected in his turning out, on even the coldest and wettest Sunday mornings, to support his house in training sessions.

It was at the College in the fifties that he met his wife, whom many will remember as Hilary Lloyd, girls' PE teacher, and his children were born here. His sister Hilda came to teach here too, and one can say that all-in-all the Hawkyards made a tremendous contribution to the early development of the College. We extend our sympathies to Hilary, who bravely attended the reunion last July shortly after Jack's death, and to all his family. *Roger Garrard*

John Paxton (62-98)

John Paxton was appointed in the early 1960s to teach Latin in the County Grammar School, which was then the second language in their curriculum. As with many others on their staff, he was also resident, and from the outset entered wholeheartedly into the boarding spirit of the College. When the CGS ceased to be a separate entity in the 1970s, and Latin disappeared from the time-table for all but the sixth form, John found a new role with Classical Studies, as part of junior forms' English, and with A level Classical Civilisation.

If it difficult to think of Wymondham College without John Paxton, it is almost as difficult to think of John Paxton without Wymondham College. For John's life, work, career, energies and affections seemed totally dedicated to the College at so many levels and in so many ways, that his sad and untimely passing has left it without one of its loyal friends.

But John's influence reached far beyond the classroom. His pastoral concern for all students under his care was meticulous. he loved the company and conversation of young people, whether in the House, the immensely popular Board Games Club or during his long walks around the Park on 'Park and Site' duty, and the students loved him in return. I shall never forget the outpouring of affection at John's final appearance at Chapel Assembly as the young people of Peel Hall made their emotional farewells.

And of course John was a kind and sympathetic colleague who always had time to talk. Truth to tell, there were times when one did not always have time to talk as long as John would have liked! but when a calm, civilised conversation on things that really matter was called for, John could provide it, and one immediately felt better for it.

John walked at about the same speed as he cycled - very slowly! One wondered how he consistently seemed to avoid the rush and panic of life which can often overtake one during the working day in a large boarding school. But he managed it, and is much missed on this account too.

Our kindest thoughts go to Joanna, John's daughter, whom he adored, and who was surely his closest friend. Those of us who remember him and worked with him record our gratitude for the kind of friendship he allowed us to share.
